TOPIC: East Bay

Abstract: The 'East Bay' encompasses the metropolitan areas in the eastern region of the San Francisco Bay Area, including inland and coastal cities in both Contra Costa and Alameda counties. The East Bay area has historically been a significant site for lesbian and gay organizing and culture, notably for queer people of color.

This list is a sampling of collections addressing East Bay LGBT histories; it is not intended to be comprehensive but rather as a series of starting points for research both within and outside the GLBT Historical Society archives. 1. ORGANIZATIONAL AND PERSONAL RECORDS:

Lavender Scrolls Project collection (#2011-04)

dates: 2007

The Lavender Scrolls Project is a community arts and social service outreach project born of a collaboration between the Lavender Seniors of the East Bay and the California Council for the Humanities in 2007. The collection contains the audio cassettes of the interviews, smaller versions of the scrolls, and other project materials. Box 1 contains transcripts of oral histories, photographs of participants, a set of mini scrolls, newspaper articles about the project and DVD footage of events where the scrolls were displayed. A Woman's Place Bookstore records (#1999-07)

dates: 1971 - 1983

This collection documents the dissolution of the early feminist bookstore, A Woman's Place. The store was also known as I.C.I.-A Woman's Place.) Started in Oakland in 1972, A Woman's Place Bookstore was run as a collective. It was an important feminist institution in the 1970s and early 1980s, especially for lesbians. Besides being a great source of books, periodicals, and other information, it served as a visible and lively cultural center. In 1981-82, a bitter dispute over 'differing views of feminism' and charges of racism split the group in two. One group of women purchased a new lock, effectively locking the other side out. After repeated attempts to discuss the matter failed, both sides agreed to binding arbitration. Soon after the arbitration was over, the store closed for good. Its founders, Carol Wilson and Alice Molloy, started another bookstore called Mama Bears. The collection contains materials surrounding the split that were collected by Darlene Pagano, one of the locked-out collective members. These include a history of the bookstore, legal documents, business correspondence, meeting minutes, ephemera and news clippings. See also the Darlene Pagano papers (1999-23).

Craig Louis papers (#1988-02)

dates: 1973 - 1988

The collection contains the personal papers of Oakland resident Craig Louis, who died from AIDS in 1988. Louis was a graphic designer. The bulk of the collection consists of cards, letters, and invitations sent between Louis and his family and friends. There are also slides of photographs of Louis, his friends and family. In addition, there are records and notes of the support group of friends who helped him during the last stages of his illness. The group distributed a publication called 'The Craig Report' that gave updates on his situation living with AIDS.

Darlene Pagano papers (#1999-23)

dates: 1979 - 1983

Activist Darlene Pagano was a member of the I.C.I.-A Woman's Place bookstore collective in Oakland in the late 1970s-early 1980s. She was co-editor of 'Against Sadomasochism' and co-authored two articles in the book. The Darlene Pagano papers

document the schism in the bookstore's collective and the lockout of four members. It also contains Pagano's production materials from 'Against Sadomasochism,' a project that evolved, in part, from discussions over whether A Woman's Place should sell books about lesbian sadomasochism. Materials include correspondence, drafts, galleys, notes, reviews, meeting minutes, the organizational papers of the 'Locked-Out 4,' news clippings and materials related to arbitration proceedings. The collection also includes a few artifacts from the lock out and audiotapes. The audiotapes include recordings of 1982 business meetings, the arbitration hearings, interviews with collective members and news reports from local radio shows dedicated to the crisis. RadioActive Queers audiotapes (#2012-07)

dates: 2000

This collection contains 23 cassette tapes from the microradio station RadioActive Queers, 87.9 FM. RadioActive Queers programming varied every week and included techno, punk, hip hop, old sci-fi radio plays, Noam Chomsky, discussions of masturbation, science news, porn, the weekly literary hour. The station broadcast in North Oakland and South Berkeley. There are also two pairs of silk screened underwear with the station's logo. Programming and on-air queers include Sarajevo Punk; DJ Olive Lucy; Anti National Broadcast Association Protests with Sal Monella; Raven Stockton; Gretta Garbage; Dark Star; Christy Concrete; Moose; No Further Data; Collage; Dr. Grendel; Words. Words. Wordz; Irony hours; and the Black Panther hip hop show.

Louise Merrill papers (#2003-40)

dates: 1906 - 2002

The Louise Merrill papers document nearly 60 years of the life and political activities of this lesbian leftist feminist who lived in Oakland. The collection provides information about class struggle, racism, and feminism through the lens of a lesbian activist. There are materials related to Merrill's activism and involvement with the Inez Garcia Defense Committee, the Berkeley Women's Affirmative Action Union, The Feminist newspaper, and the Workers World Party. Included are correspondence, notes, writings, journals, legal documents, subject files related to her political activities, publications by other feminists and activists, photographs, news clippings, and personalia including family documents and photographs that date back to 1906. Steve Conley papers (#2013-17)

dates: 1950 - 2008

This collection contains materials related to progressive activist Steve Conley (1950-2009). Conley was a Vietnam vet, writer, director, media and radio producer, DJ, poet, teacher, journalist, community organizer, percussionist and performing artist. He was involved with The Noodle Factory, a performance space in West Oakland, and he produced the Tenant Leadership Summits, which brought together community organizations active in a wide variety of issues. The collection has DVDs, CDs, DAT tapes and Sony mini-disks that have recordings of the Tenant Leadership Summit [2004], and with Tiny Garcia from Poor Magazine; materials from Conley's work on air and on the board at KPFA and KPFA; photos of events like Up Your Alley; artwork; business letters; and musical projects Conley produced and/or designed. There are also snapshots and negatives of political protests, family, friends and Conley's travels in Asia, Egypt and Europe. These date from 1978 to 2008. The collection also includes some of Conley's personal effects, such as jewelry, tarot cards, harmonica, and percussion instruments, a datebook, conference badges and ID cards.

Everett Boucre scrapbooks

dates: 1941 - 1978

Everett Boucre (1902-1984) was a dance instructor and performer who lived in Oakland, California. The collection includes two scrapbooks: a World War II era scrapbook with cut out pictures of war scenes and soldiers. The other scrapbook includes pictures of men's "baskets." There is a mimeograph page at the beginning of this scrapbook about the Basket Makers of America Club (B.M.A.C.) These date from the 1950s-1970s. (#2014-18).

4. EPHEMERA:

San Francisco LGBT Business Ephemera Collection (#BUS EPH)

12.5 linear feet

Consists of ephemera collected from businesses owned, operated or frequented by members of the LGBT community located in San Francisco and the greater Bay Area. Businesses in Russian River, San Jose, Sacramento, Berkeley and Oakland are also represented. Types of businesses include: bars and clubs; cabarets, performance venues and theaters; restaurants; bookstores and publishers; newspapers and magazines; art galleries; clothing and retail stores; BDSM (bondage) and sex toy shops; video stores and movie theaters; pot clubs and marijuana dispensaries; hotels and inns, and other travel or tourism related businesses. Also includes national corporations marketing to the LGBT community. The bulk of the material dates from the 1970s through the 1990s. While most of the material is intended for business related purposes, it is also reflective of LGBT community building and activism, and its literary, art, music and entertainment scenes. Types of ephemera include: advertisements, event announcements, benefit and show fliers, postcards, invitations, theatrical playbills, brochures, direct mail, sales catalogs, menus, napkins, tickets, letterheads, business cards, and some internal business communications and financial records.

San Francisco LGBT General Subjects Ephemera Collection (SUB EPH)

37 boxes (16.5 linear feet)

Consists of a wide range of ephemera related to LGBT communities in San Francisco and the Bay Area, representing a diverse collection of subjects, ranging from AIDS, bathhouses, city agencies and sex clubs, to collections of catalogs and directories. Much of the materials were produced by unaffiliated groups or individuals and ad hoc coalitions or committees for one-time events or ongoing public causes, including: Pride parades; theater productions; films, art exhibitions and shows; protests; election issues;

Business materials are represented, including: service oriented, networked or freelance businesses; travel agencies; publishers; therapists; instructors; and sex clubs and bathhouses. Includes materials from social clubs; sports teams; religious groups; and gay, lesbian or queer studies classes. Personal ephemera includes: funeral programs and memorials; wedding announcements; garage sales; birth and adoption announcements; and private party invitations. Also contains materials related to the governing bodies of the city of San Francisco.

San Francisco LGBT Groups Ephemera Collection (GRP EPH)

68 boxes (33 Linear feet)

Consists of ephemera pertaining to groups affiliated with San Francisco's LGBT community. The bulk of the material is from the late 1970s through the 1990s, with the homophile groups of the 1960s represented as well. Groups include: community service centers; governmental organizations; various social groups and clubs; musical groups, choirs and bands; theatrical companies and performance groups; dance troupes; literary groups and non-profit publishers; scholarly associations; universities, colleges, institutes and schools; student and youth groups; religious and spiritual centers; motorcycle clubs; sports teams; communes, cooperatives and collectives; political parties; business and neighborhood associations; legal aid centers; clinics and hospitals; leather groups. Most of the materials are related to the prominent national political and social events and movements of their time, primarily the Gay Liberation Movement, the Gay Rights Movement, and the AIDS crisis. Types of ephemera represented include: announcements, fliers, postcards, invitations, theatrical playbills, brochures, direct mail, conference schedules, booklets, guides, directories, letterheads, business cards, meeting minutes, correspondence, and magazine and newspaper clippings.
